

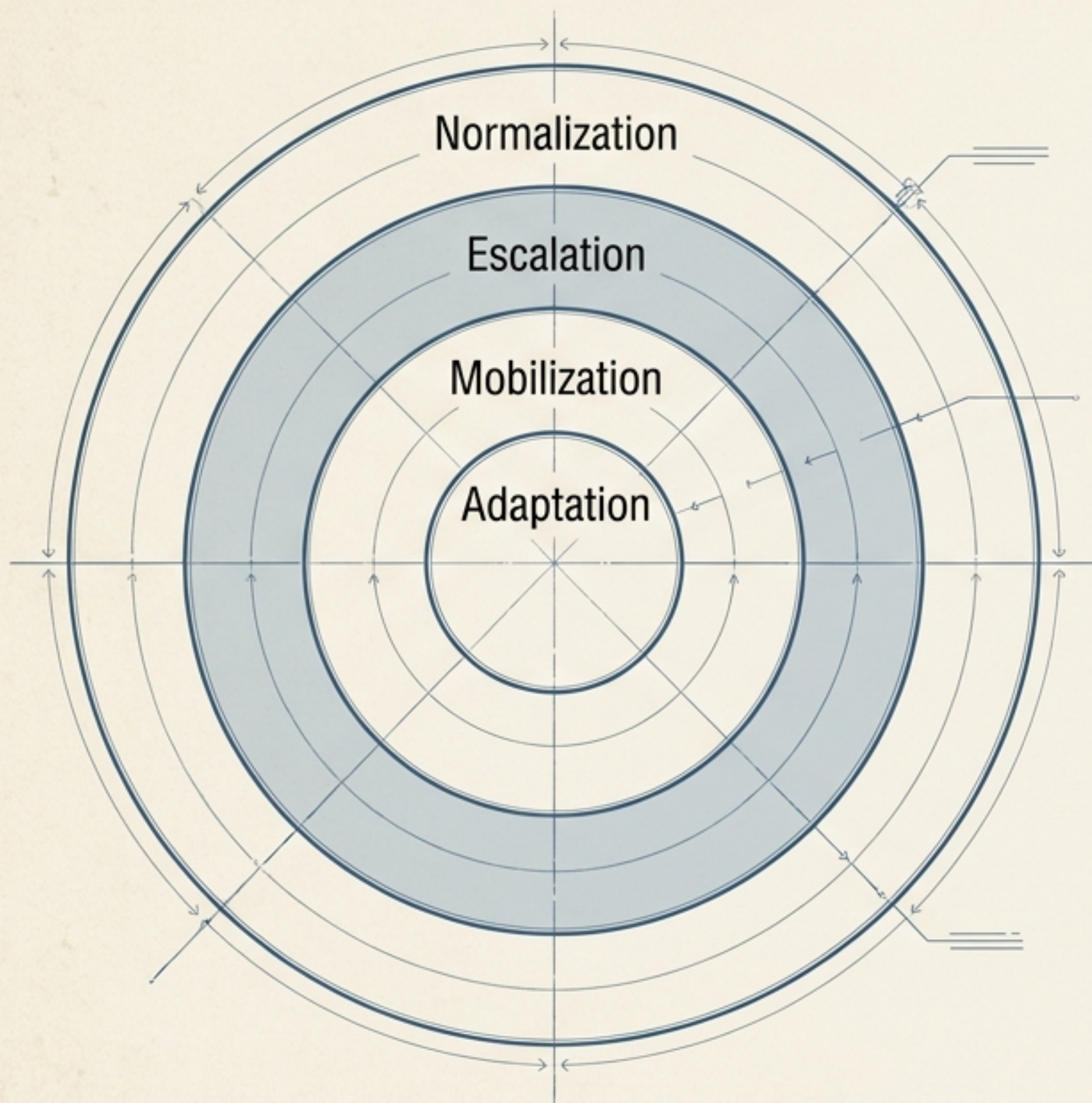

The Return of the Forbidden Question

“Why do wars persist when most people do not want war?”

The official explanations are immediate and visible: who attacked first, which border was crossed, what militia must be destroyed. But visible violence is not the whole system.

The promised security never arrives because the next war is prepared within the last one.

War is not merely an event. It is a self-reproducing system of institutional survival.

Institutional Autopoietization

Institutional autopoietization occurs when an institution created to serve life shifts to consuming life to preserve itself as a system. The state supplies legitimacy; intelligence conceals; finance disciplines; law codifies; media narrates.



The Engine: Ungrieved Trauma as Political Fuel

Collective trauma does not disappear when it is denied. It becomes politically available.
When grief cannot become truth and repair, it becomes fear.



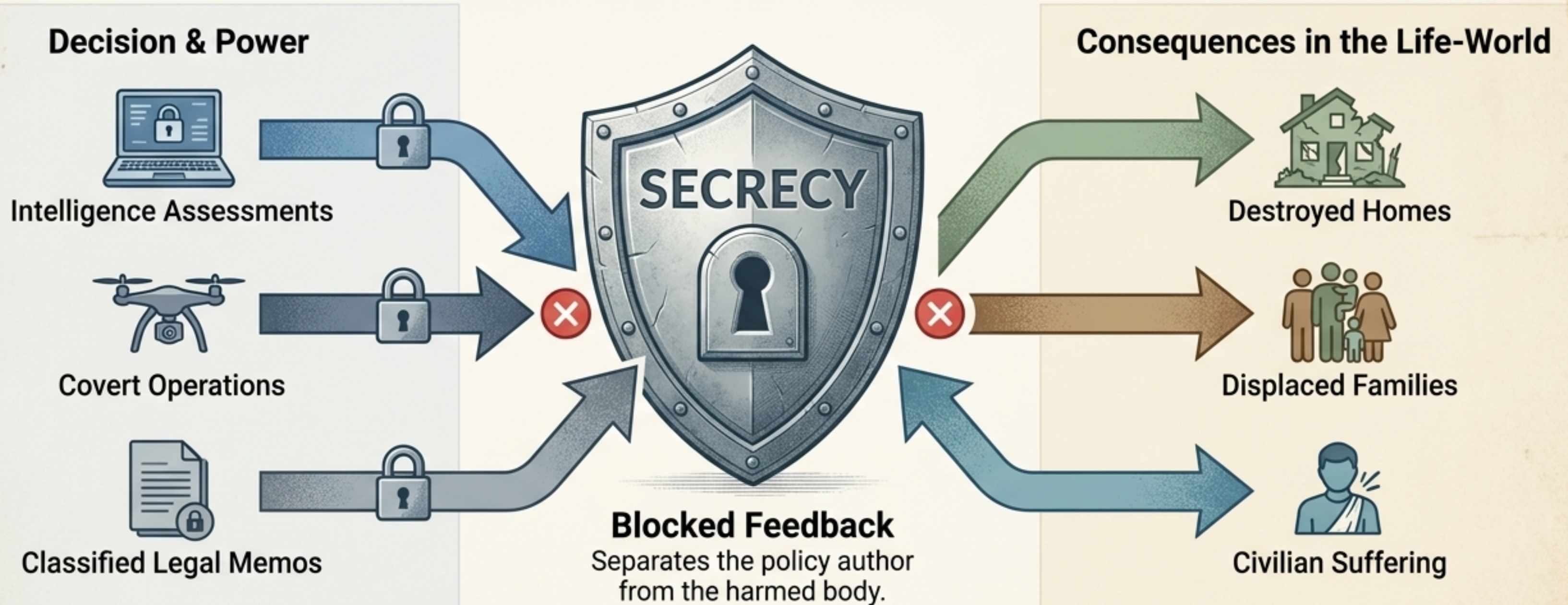
The Architecture of Violence

Visible violence shocks the conscience, but invisible violence disables the conscience before it can act. The missile is visible; the intelligence assessment remains hidden.



The Secrecy Shield: Interrupting Life-Correction

Secrecy is defended as statecraft. But it becomes life-dangerous when it ceases to protect the public and begins to protect power from the public.



When truth cannot travel, accountability cannot arrive.

The Nation-State as Sacrificial Machine

The state's most dangerous power is not only its monopoly on violence, but its monopoly on legitimate sacrifice. The autopoietic state converts life into state-material.

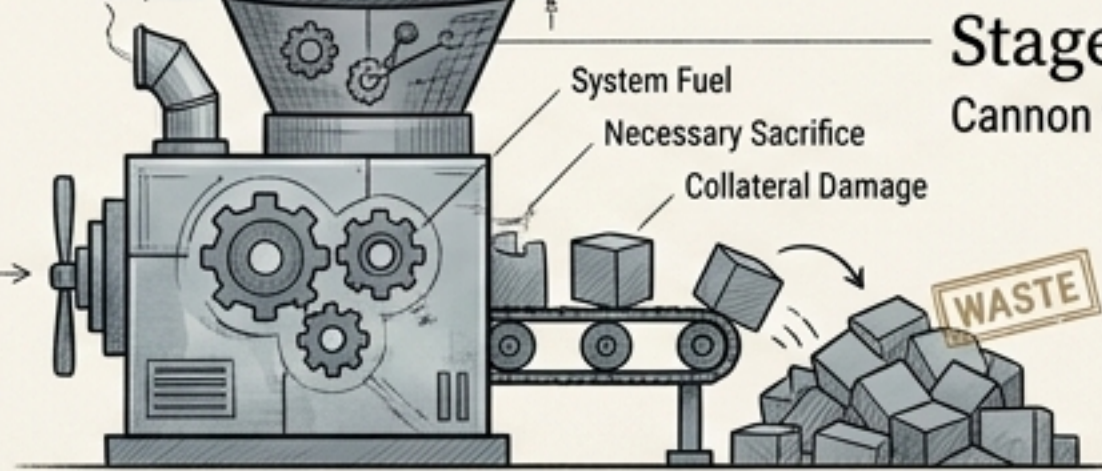

Cultural Violence: The Production of Ungrievable People

Before a population can be bombed, starved, or occupied without unbearable moral injury to the **harming society**, it must first be placed **outside the ordinary circle of concern**. Its dead must become less individually mournable.

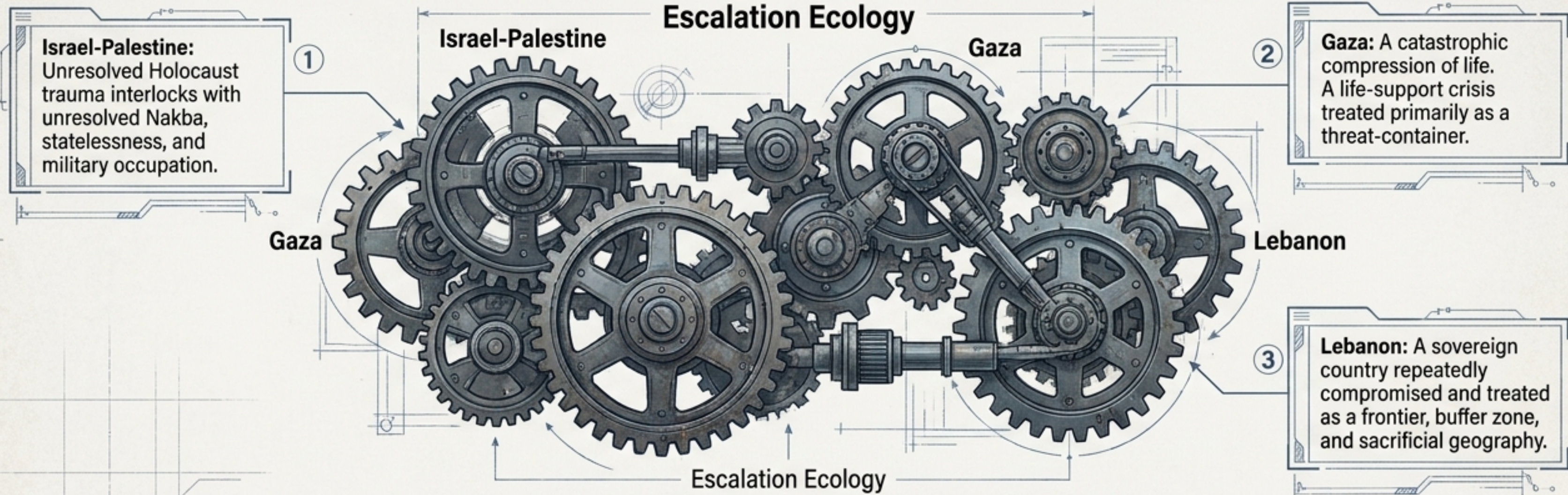

The Middle East: A Burning Case Study

The Middle East is a burning mirror of globalized insecurity—an escalation ecology where history, trauma, empire, occupation, and state survival fuse into a self-reproducing war-system.



The Moral Anchor

A life-coherent analysis refuses false equivalence (which flattens responsibility) and selective humanity (which renders one side's victims invisible). Asymmetrical responsibility must coexist with equal non-disposability.

“No institution may claim legitimacy if its survival depends on making any living community disposable.”


The Life-Coherence Criterion

War and security must be judged by a standard deeper than victory, deterrence, or national survival.






The ultimate criterion is life. Does a decision protect and regenerate the conditions of life, or disable and destroy them?

The Security Life-Test

No security decision should be considered legitimate until these questions are answered.

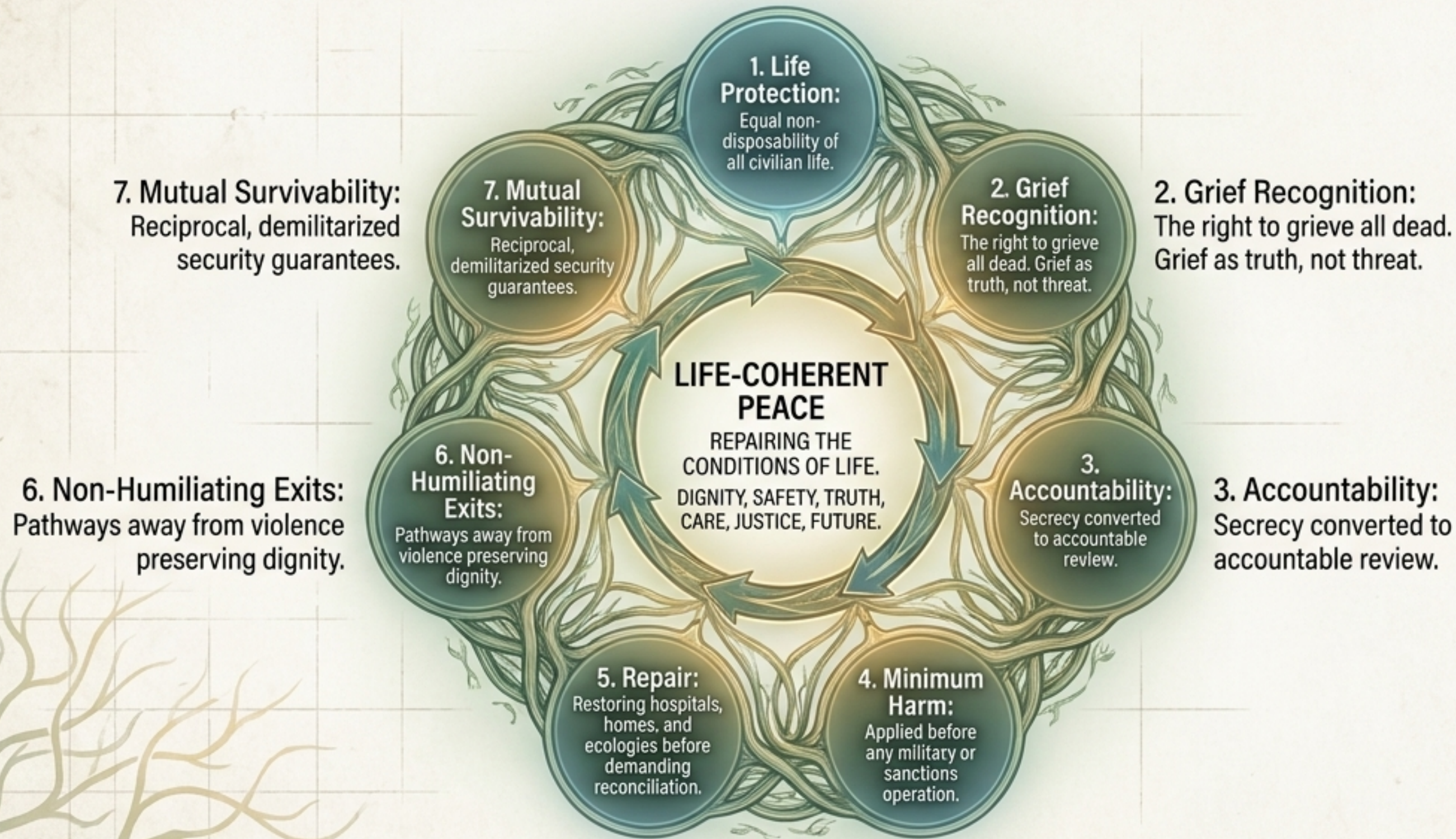

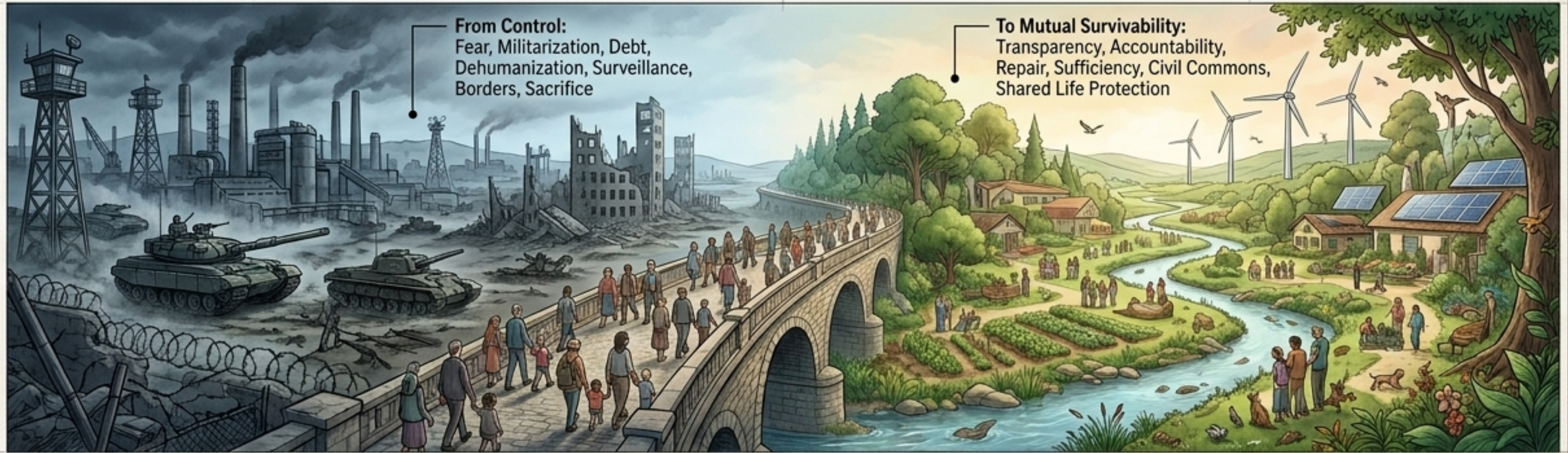
